I would like to thank our magnificent CFA volunteers for their hard work during this summer's bushfires. This fire season has been devastating in its scale, coverage and duration. It has caused immense physical damage and tragic loss of life.

During times of crisis, Australians work together. Our own community was on the front line in combating these fires in both New South Wales and Victoria. Members of the Dromana, Flinders, Rosebud and Rye CFA's, as well as other brigades, played an active role in firefighting across the summer. Having met with families in bushfire ravaged communities, local admiration and gratitude for our firefighters is incalculable.

Alongside this direct action on the fire fronts, The Mornington Peninsula Shire and

HMAS Cerberus assisted in the evacuation of residents and tourists from Mallacoota aboard HMAS Choules and MV Sycamore to Western Port. On behalf of those evacuees, I want to acknowledge and thank the Shire, Somerville Recreation Centre staff and naval personnel in assisting evacuees.

Recognising the critical need to support those affected, the Australian Government has provided \$76 million for additional mental health services. Part of the \$2 billion National Bushfire Recovery Initiative, this funding will ensure that emergency services workers and their families have access to extensive and ongoing mental health care. All of Australia stands with our firefighters and communities as they rebuild and recover.

Improving recycled water infrastructure on the Peninsula

One of my proudest endeavours as an MP was working with the local community to clean up the Gunnamatta outflow. Now, this much improved recycled water will be put to good use on the Mornington Peninsula.

The Morrison Government is helping to improve community water supply by delivering \$300,000 for improved recycled water infrastructure on the **Mornington Peninsula**.

The project will deliver Grade-A recycled water from Melbourne Water's South Eastern

Outfall at Emil Madsen Reserve on Wooralla Drive in **Mt Eliza**, to a storage dam on **Mornington** Golf Course.

The water will be used to improve ecological outcomes for the course, the community surrounding the golf club, as well as provide consistent water supply in case of emergency. This funding is in addition to the \$300,000 we secured to support the development of a business case for the Hinterland Environmental Water Scheme.

Road upgrades across the Mornington Peninsula

As part of the 2019 Federal Budget, I was proud to secure \$86 million for road projects across the Mornington Peninsula, including:

- The Jetty Road/Mornington Peninsula Freeway intersection at Rosebud
- The intersections of Forest Drive and Uralla Road with the Nepean Highway in Mount Martha
- Sound barriers installation at levels of high volume between Dromana and Rosebud
- Frankston-Flinders Road in Balnarring

In December, I met with the Federal Minister for Population, Cities and Urban Infrastructure, the Hon Alan Tudge MP, to discuss all of these projects and can confirm that these projects will all be delivered in partnership with the Victorian government, with exact start dates to be announced as planning works progress.

I welcome the Victorian Government in joining the Australian

Government to improve these vital roads across the Mornington Peninsula.

In addition to this delivered funding, with the support of over 100 locals, I have written to the Victorian Roads Minister advocating for improved infrastructure at the **Nepean Highway/Country Club Drive** intersection in **Safety Beach**. I ask all concerned locals to contact me to add their voice to this cause.

Helen Powell's legacy lives on through Wonder Woman Walk

We here on the Mornington Peninsula know how strong our community spirit is. Nowhere was this more evident than during the Wonder Woman Walk to support the Ovarian Cancer Research Foundation (OCRF).

Started by Peninsula local Helen Powell, who sadly recently lost her own battle with ovarian cancer, this event has raised over \$26,000 for the OCRF, with 2018 alone raising nearly \$15,000.

Last year, two hundred Mornington Peninsula women walked the beautiful coastline of the Mornington Peninsula from the **Safety Beach** Sailing Club to Hotel **Sorrento**, a distance of close to 30 kilometres.

Events like this show the true spirit of the Mornington Peninsula and I'm delighted that Helen's friends will continue the annual event as a fitting tribute to her dedication to her community, her work raising awareness of the warning signs of ovarian cancer and to raise funds for such a worthy cause.

New Crib Point Fire Station opens

Locals in Western Port will be even better protected for the next fire season following the opening of the Crib Point CFA's new fire station.

The new station gives the CFA two new truck bays, increased height in the motor pool to allow for more modern tankers, a breathing apparatus repair room, as well as increased space for our fire fighters.

It was a privilege to work alongside the CFA during this process, to secure a peppercorn lease from HMAS Cerberus and the Department of Defence for the land for this new station and I'm thrilled to see how far this Brigade has come.

We worked closely and tirelessly with the CFA and the Department of Defence on this project and the finished station is a testament not only to the fire fighters themselves, but the immense community spirit surrounding the Crib Point CFA.

Taking responsible action on climate change

As a father with a young family on the Peninsula, I understand the concern and the distress for many this bushfire season, although having met the families evacuated from Mallacoota, I am aware that we have been thankfully spared the direct fear and devastation of the bushfires in our own region.

The science on man-made climate change is clear: climate change is playing a role in driving increasing temperatures, more severe droughts and longer fire seasons.

It has undoubtedly been a factor and behind this season's unprecedented fires - along with the drought, how land is managed, the way hazard reduction burns are planned and carried out as well as sadly, in some cases, arson.

While climate change is driven by global emissions, we have a critical role to play.

In that respect. Australia's total emissions have fallen from 610 million tonnes in 2005 to 532 million tonnes in 2019.

Australia needs to play its part, and we are successfully doing exactly that through meaningful

- · We are world leaders in renewable energy investment
- In 2019, we set new records for renewable capacity installation and total electricity generated from renewables.
- The Clean Energy Regulator estimates that a record 6.3 gigawatts (GW) of new renewable capacity was installed in 2019, 24 per cent above the previous record set in 2018.

Our policy is to meet and beat our targets - and to reduce our emissions. We aim to continuously do better and better.

Peninsula Schools benefit from Local Schools Community Fund

Focus on Health

Tackling heart disease and stroke

The Morrison Government is delivering \$12 million worth of research grants through its Cardiovascular Health Mission to tackle the nation's two biggest killers - heart disease and stroke.

Cardiovascular disease is an area in which Australia can boast strong recent success, with deaths falling by almost 70 per cent over the past three decades.

This investment will continue to support innovative, high quality, collaborative research that focuses on prevention, early-intervention, treatment and survivorship of heart disease and stroke.

This is in addition to \$1 million in funding from the Medical Research Future Fund (MRFF) Frontiers Initiative to develop, test and ultimately implement portable brain imaging tools in air and road ambulances.

Our Government is delivering a strong research agenda to find more effective methods for preventing, treating and managing heart conditions and stroke for all Australians.



\$437 million for ground-breaking health and medical research

The Morrison Government is investing in health and medical research projects across Australia, aimed at delivering better treatments, diagnosis and care.

A total of 495 projects will receive funding from the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) which will include \$68 million for cancer research, \$58 million for cardiovascular research and \$27 million for genomics research, and comprise the outcomes of the first rounds of the new grant program schemes for Ideas Grants, Synergy Grants, and Clinical Trials and Cohort Studies Grants.

This investment in health and medical research will place Australia at the leading edge of research in areas like genomics and will support the search for cures and treatments including for rare cancers.

New hope for breast cancer patients

Australians living with advanced breast cancer now have access to an important new treatment option, with the Morrison Government listing a life-changing new medicine on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS).

On January 1, Verzenio® (abemaciclib) was listed on the PBS for the first time. It treats non-premenopausal patients with advanced hormone receptor positive human epidermal growth factor receptor 2 negative breast cancer.

Without the subsidy, patients would pay up to \$55,500 a year to access this medicine. As a result of this listing on the PBS, they will now only pay \$41 per script, or, for concessional patients, just \$6.60 per script.

Since 2013, the Australian Government has listed more than 2,300 new or amended listings on the PBS. This represents an average of around 30 listings or amendments per month - or one each day - at an overall investment by the Government of \$10.9 billion.
